

Buischer, Ont.
Oct. 27, 1933.

A special meeting of the Council of the Village of Buischer was held in Mr. Fount's office and notice of meeting is hereby waived.

All members of the Council were present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

The account for the sidewalk in front of Crown Lumber Company property, and the alley to the east of the Crown Lumber Co. was discussed and fuller information is to be obtained concerning same and is to come up at a later date. It being understood that the Village was not to pay this account until more taxes were available.

The Secretary is to get information regarding John Scheffelmaier as to whether or not he was working for the C.P.R. or if his insurance was in force during the period that his wife was in the General Hospital, Calgary and attended by Dr. Milne the accounts of which the Village are now asked to pay. Mr. Scheffelmaier was also to be asked to attend the next meeting.

John Uselman asked the Council for relief and it was recommended that he be provided with a load of coal and the Secretary to get the usual forms prepared and signed at the time of payment.

The Secretary was advised to send out Tax Reminders.

The application of Stan Stratford to operate the rink was considered and laid over until next meeting.

The Secretary was authorized to reply to Mr. Howson M.L.A. letter re clause 374 of the Liberal Platform and to advise Mr. Howson that this Council unanimously approved of such clause.

The question of sale of lots under Consent came in for much discussion and it was decided that these lots could not be sold satisfactorily under the present conditions and it would be better for all concerned to wait until a later date.

The new highway connection having been completed the pay sheets and cost of material were to be prepared and forwarded to the Department of Public Works.

Moved that the meeting adjourn.
